


MISS CLAY-SMITH



MENTAL HEALTH COMMITTEE UPDATE Morgy Blelloch, Year 10

As one of Kings Academy Prospect's mental health and anti-bullying ambassadors I dedicate myself to make sure the mental health and well-being of the school is looked after and the same with all the other ambassadors. Our anti-bullying meeting are usually every other Friday as it can't be on the same day as the breakfast with the head teacher. There is about 20 or more kids across all year groups and tutors that attend these meetings.

For me personally, I joined these groups as it seemed very interesting and learning about all the signs and even being aware of antibullying and mental health is a great life skill, even knowing how to speak to victims of mental health and bullying is an amazing personal skill to have. Knowing people will

come to me asking me to help them makes me feel happy and it's a wonderful experience.

Recently we've been listing the pros and cons of the school's awareness of bullying and mental health from our perspectives, as having a student's opinion is often needed, we also look into the signs of bullying and the difference between bullying and if its consistent enough to be classed as bullying. This ties into the subjects we cover in the mental health meetings, we learn about the how bullying massively affects the mental health of the victims of bullying.

On some occasions both mental health and anti-bullying groups combine for a joint session lead by Miss McCabe and Mr Lyddon, this is so both the mental health and anti-bullying ambassadors can join together to

come up with great ideas on how to end the stigma of mental health and how to help those who are a victim to bullying.


Year 10's have shown some strong performances in a very tough league this year, and although they sit joint 2nd in the league a 2-1 victory against Denefield was a highlight.


Year 11's beat Theale Green 5–0 on Thursday evening, and were crowned undefeated Reading Conference League Champions 2022. Well done gentlemen!

Enjoy the break and work hard too!



Recently, I qualified for National Age
Groups 2022 in Plymouth. It all started
when Central Swimming Pool closed; I entered
Albatross Diving Club when I was young, 11
years old, and was given a spot in their Right
Track programme. In this, they give newly
competitive divers to start competing – and
even a chance to compete at the lowest
national level in England; otherwise known as
National Skills.

In 2019, I qualified for this event and competed in it in July 2019 – it was new experience for me, and I enjoyed it thoroughly. At this stage, I was training roughly 3 times per week, travelling to Hemel Hempstead once a week, and Southampton once a month. Then the COVID-19 pandemic hit, and the UK went



into lockdown, home training began, and unfortunately it took a toll on everyone's mental health and overall fitness; Albatross Diving Club ran Zoom workout sessions to combat the lack of performance which I really enjoyed, this was until the pools opened again. Once this was over, and pools reopened, we returned to training. I then competed in an Age Group level competition (a step up from National Skills), called the Armada Cup in Plymouth; I did very well for my first competition at this level and qualified for

National Age Groups on two boards: one metre and three metre – I was extremely proud of my achievement.

Now, I train five days a week, often four, to prepare for the National Age Groups – now travelling to Hemel Hempstead twice a week and Southampton once a week. Diving has helped me build my confidence by learning new dives and competing at a national level.


Finlay Stratford

The Yr13's will soon be handing over the leadership baton to the Yr12 with applications soon to be invited for the new leadership team.




ECO CLUB

As well as this, the club spent an afternoon making guacamole and are growing the seeds in the hope of obtaining some avocado trees!

PSYCHOLOGY TASTER

Recently, Alison Hall came into our
Psychology class from Reading University
to deliver a fun and interactive taster
session to us psychology students – the
session was focused on memory and
perception and included optical illusions,
memory tests and virtual reality images
of the human brain and body.

The session started with Alison introducing herself and what she does at the University of Reading before the first activity – the 'Stroop Test.' For this activity, we were told to work in pairs and time each other reading three lists of words and stating the colour of each word. The lists were: colours (e.g., 'red,' 'blue,' 'yellow'), written in a black font; nouns, written in different coloured fonts (e.g., 'marrow' in

red, 'ball' in blue) and colours in different coloured fonts (e.g., 'red' in blue, 'yellow' in green). The results showed that people were fastest when reading out the list of colours written in black font; this is because our brain is only processing the words and not the colours. We were all slowest at reading the third list as the different colours confused our brains, as we immediately want to state the colour that is written down rather than the colour of the font. This experiment aimed to show we read words faster than we process colours and helped us gain insight into how our brains process information.

In the second activity, we were shown a video of someone placing cards from a deck on the table. We were tasked with counting the



number of red cards in the deck, but by focusing on the cards, we did not see the seven changes to the background - this demonstrated selective attention as we focused on one aspect of a situation and became unaware of what is happening around us. We were also shown a video of people passing a basketball and asked to count how many times the players in white passed the ball, which distracted us from the gorilla walking through the players.

The next task involved us being shown a range of optical illusions, including 'the black and blue dress' and 'the spinning woman' to test

how we perceive images based on their surroundings. We found that light and shadow can affect how our eyes interpret colour, as different members of the class saw different colours in the same image of the famous 'blue and black/white and gold' dress. We also found that if there are no background indicators in a video (as seen in 'the spinning woman'), our brains cannot interpret the visual information, and this causes the direction of her spinning to change.

After this, we did another activity where Alison read out 20 short sentences and half of the class were asked to rank them by how difficult they were to pronounce (Handout 1), and the other half were asked to produce a mental image of the sentence (Handout A). When

asked questions about the sentences, most of the group who were given Handout A recalled more details than those given Handout 1 – this shows that we remember information better if we imagine it rather than just listening to the words.

The session continued with us using VR headsets to look at a 3D model of the human brain and nervous system, which was very interesting to see. Some people also got to look at their brain waves and heartbeat using electrodes, and we looked at how the activity of the visual cortex (responsible for processing visual information) was affected by opening and closing our eyes and looking in different directions, which was fascinating!

The session ended with a discussion about careers in psychology and how we can develop our psychological knowledge, which was extremely useful and rounded off the taster well.

Overall, the session was brilliant and really gave us an insight into the world of psychology outside of our A Level syllabus, and we are very grateful that Alison took time to visit us and deliver such an engaging session!

PSYCHOLOGY: EYE WITNESS TESTIMONY REPORT

Recently in our psychology class we began looking at memory and for the last few lessons specifically witness testimony.


Eye witness testimonies are pieces of evidence provided in court by someone who witnessed a crime, however many things affect them.

One of these things is leading questions, these suggest the type of answer that is desired of the question asker wants. This is problematic because it misleads the witness into retelling their memory wrong.


In our class we created an experiment to test the effect of leading questions on eye witness testimonies. We split our class in half, one group would cause the scene on which the

testimony would be on and the other would pose the questions. The experiment would start when Izzy, Ellie and Maizie entered a year 7 classroom with Miss Blake as the teacher – who was briefed beforehand. Izzy would enter first, run through the classroom disrupting the students towards the light switch, turning all of the lights off before opening the door and running out. Directly behind her would be Ellie who would run down the center aisle of the class, disrupting as she went grabbing the bag (a fake for Miss Blakes, placed before hand by Miss Scott) then running out of the class. Maizie would be right behind her, running down the furthest right side of the classroom, furthest from the door. She would also

disrupted the class and then grab a box of chocolates from the front of the class, before running out the door and slamming it behind her.

Miss Blakes class, obviously began reacting to this scene, but she instructed them to be quiet, stop talking about it and continue their work. This means that strengthen the memory of that they saw was prevented.

A few minutes after Izzy, Ellie and Maizie had left the classroom, Miss Scott went in acting as if she was on patrol. She asked if everything was alright, and the students all began speaking and relaying what they had seen. Miss Scott then left stating she was going to look for us. The other half of our class then went back to take fake statements, using their preplanned questions, which were posed specifically to be leading ones. There was a combination of questions but most revolved around the events of what happened, the

appearance of the three girls and what we wore. The main leading question was 'What colour hat did one of the girls have on'. None of us had a hat on, but instead Ellie had had her hood up. This question did in fact mislead a great number of the Year 7 class. Some stating that the hat was grey (the hood had been grey, but it hadn't been a hat), some saying other colours and others describing the shape of it.

Our experiment proved that eye witness testimonies are easily manipulated and that leading questions are a big issue in courts both for sides as it affects the overall truth. This could lead to an innocent person being imprisoned or the rightful offender being let free.



Coral Reef Essay, Paige Brooker

All coral reefs can be found in between The Tropics on the Equator, 30 degrees North and 30 degrees South. The world's coral reefs are under threat for multiple reasons, including the biggest (The Crown-of-Thorns Starfish and climate change) and the smallest threats (e.g. Careless Tourism). Although these are still threats, some are more significant than others.


I strongly believe that the Crown-of-Thorns Starfish is one of the biggest threats to coral reefs. It is proven that the Starfish is a known predator to marine life, coral reefs and humans included. This Crown-of-Thorns Starfish spits out digestive acid, which make coral reefs decay if it is touched. It can also pollute the water as well, which can block out the sunlight. It is clear that this is an extremely large threat, the Starfish can and will continue to thrive in rising sea temperatures caused by climate change.

In my opinion, one of the smaller threats is Careless Tourism. As we know, tourism can be dangerous if we don't know what we're doing.
